### About the Programs

The program for January will be club member Tim Anderson presenting on working with opals. For the program in February, Scott Howard, State Geologist, with the aid of his SCDNR team, will cover a range of topics such as history of the Geologic Survey, current projects, how geology data contributes to the betterment of the State, long-range plans and projects, and current capacities and expertise. ## News Worth Digging Up

### When rainforests died, the planet caught fire: New clues from Earth's greatest extinction

The Permian-Triassic Mass Extinction - sometimes referred to as the "Great Dying," happened around 252 million years ago, leading to the massive loss of marine species and significant declines in terrestrial plants and animals. The event has been attributed to intense global warming triggered by a period of volcanic activity in Siberia, known as the Siberian Traps, but scientists had been unable to pinpoint why super-greenhouse conditions persisted for around five million years afterwards. "Fossil clues from this research show the Great Dying's lingering heat wasn't just volcanic but likely attributable to deforested tropics that stopped absorbing carbon thereby letting greenhouse gases spike and temperatures soar."

A team of international researchers led by the University of Leeds and the China University of Geosciences gathered new data which supports the theory that the demise of tropical forests, and their slow recovery, limited carbon sequestration resulting in high levels of CO<sub>2</sub> and a prolonged period of extreme heat. The team used analysis of a vast amount of fossils as well as clues about past climate conditions found in sedimentary rocks to map changes in plant productivity during the Permian-Triassic Mass Extinction. "Now, after years of fieldwork, analysis and simulations, the team have the data that supports a prolonged period of tropical biosphere collapse."

The researchers believe their results reinforce the idea that thresholds, or 'tipping points' exist in Earth's climate-carbon system which, when reached, means that warming can be amplified. Professor Mills, a coauthor, added: "There is a warning here about the importance of Earth's present day tropical forests. If rapid warming causes them to collapse in a similar manner, then we should not expect our climate to cool to preindustrial levels even if we stop emitting CO<sub>2</sub>.

"Indeed, warming could continue to accelerate in this case even if we reach zero human emissions. We will have fundamentally changed the carbon cycle in a way that can take geological timescales to recover, which has happened in Earth's past."



At the end of 2025 the Club had **142 members**: 115 adults and 42 juniors.

**Rocky Trails:** The CGMS newsletter, the Rocky Trails, was issued monthly. The newsletter was distributed to members by email.

The 57th Annual CGMS Show was held at Jamil Temple on November 21, 22 and 22. The Show was a success thanks to the hard work of the show committee, club volunteers, and our highly valued vendors. Show planning meetings were held monthly starting in April. We had 38 vendors, completely filling the available space. The dealers offered jewelry, beads, mineral specimens, fossils and more for sale. We held a dinner for the dealers on Thursday evening. Show attendance was 1222, similar to last year. The show opened on Friday at 10 am and closed on Sunday at 5 pm. Members set up display cases exhibiting fossils and minerals as well as the South Carolina state stone (amethyst) and the South Carolina state stone (blue granite), and the raffle prizes: grape agate and a selenite crystal cluster. Members demonstrated copper and silver jewelry-making, flint knapping and wire wrapping. The geode cutting saw was busy out front, with members selling and cutting beautiful geodes. Grab bags were offered for \$2, \$5 and \$10. Door prizes donated by dealers and members were awarded hourly. Instead of a grand door prize, we had a raffle for two prizes awarded at the end of the show.

**Monthly Meetings** were held on the third Monday for the general meeting and the fourth Monday for the executive meeting. The General Meetings were held at Hope Church. Guest speakers gave educational programs. Executive meetings were held at Grecian Gardens in West Columbia.

The 2025 Programs were:

**A club picnic** was held at Sesquicentennial State Park on November 8. We had a beautiful fall day with fall foliage and perfect weather! The nature walk was very enjoyable, and the birds did not disappoint! When the grill got fired up it was covered with brats and sausages, a remarkable sight.

## CGMS Field trips:

Since new field trip chair, Casey Tyler, filled the previously vacant position, we had club-specific field trips for CGMS members in 2025:

- In February, Columbia Gem and Mineral Society members were invited to join the Aiken club on a field trip to an Augusta area mine.
- May 10, CGMS panned for gold in Union, SC
- May 31, CGMS collected at Graves Mountain in Lincolnton, Georgia.
- June 24, CGMS went to Propst Farm in NC to collect corundum (rubies and sapphires)
- Week of September 8, CGMS went to various mines in Mt. Ida, Arkansas to collect quartz crystals
- October 4, CGMS sponsored the October DMC field trip, which was a boat trip to Morris Island to collect fossils deposited in dredge spoils from Charleston Harbor.

**In addition, the Southeastern Federation of Mineralogical Societies, Inc. field trips were available to club members:**

January: No SFMS field trip in January.

February: Emerald Hollow Mine Hiddenite, NC. Over sixty minerals can be collected including emerald, aquamarine, sapphire, garnet, topaz, amethyst, citrine, rutile, and tourmaline. There is an abundance of world class smoky and clear quartz crystals. The rare mineral hiddenite can be found only in the Hiddenite area.

March: Hogg Mine, LaGrange, GA. The mine contains a large pegmatite with beryl, rose quartz, smokey quartz, tourmaline, muscovite, and kaolinite.

April: Bayou Pierre, Hazlehurst, Copiah County, MS. Extensive deposits of Citronelle Formation gravel are exposed in the stream bed and along the banks of the Bayou Pierre River as it meanders through rural Copiah County, Mississippi. Expect to find agates, petrified wood, fossil brachiopods, bryozoans, coral, crinoid stems, and other gravel.

May: Smith County Lime Pit Smith County MS. The site is an Early Oligocene marine deposit of the Vicksburg group. It consists largely of fossiliferous limestones and clays. Here you can collect a variety of shark teeth, mollusks (scallop & oyster shells, moldic gastropods & bivalves), echinoids like sand dollars and sea urchins, crabs, bryozoans, and other marine fossils.

June: A private dig site in Conover, NC, to collect small books of muscovite mica, smoky quartz crystals, feldspar, tourmaline, with some occurrences of green beryl, amethyst, and ilmenite.

July: Bone Valley Experience, Wauchula, Florida to collect fossilized shark teeth including smaller species such as lemon, bull, and dusky and a chance to find larger snaggletooth, mako, and megalodon teeth.

August: Private Cattle Ranch, Rockmart, Georgia. Exposed in the soil is the Longview Chert of the Knox Group which is Late Cambrian to Early Ordovician in age. The chert is multi-colored with some specimens being an agate.

September: Cumberland Furnace, Cumberland Furnace, TN, to collect slag. The slag was a byproduct of making iron. Some of the slag is quite colorful in shades of blue and green, some with swirls.

October: CGMS sponsored the October DMC field trip, which was a boat trip to Morris Island to collect fossils deposited in dredge spoils from Charleston Harbor.

November: Norris Lake, TN to collect Upper Ordovician marine fossils along the shore of Norris Lake, including stromatolites and brachiopods.

There was no SFMS field trip in December.

**Lapidary Workshop:** Although CGMS did not have a lapidary workshop location in 2025, a limited amount of equipment, rock saws and cabbing machines were operational in a storage unit. Members learned how to cut, polish and cab under the tutelage of Gary Hert. Cheryl Coker is leading the effort to locate a property for CGMS to purchase to set up or build a workshop.




